MI Backpack Home Tests

An At-Home COVID-19 Testing Pilot Program for K–12 Settings

Expanding on the MI Safer Schools Testing Program launched by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) in the 2020-2021 school year, MDHHS is piloting a new program to make a limited number of free, at-home COVID antigen tests available to students in Michigan's schools in the 2021-2022 school year. This pilot program offers one more tool—in addition to in-school testing, masking, ventilation, and other strategies—to create a safer environment for students, staff, and families. This is a proof-of-concept pilot to see whether free at-home COVID testing is useful and accepted in a group at elevated risk for COVID-19.

What?

MI Backpack Home Tests is a voluntary program offered by MDHHS for Michigan K–12 students, educators, staff, and their families who want an extra layer of protection against COVID-19. Every person enrolled in the program will receive one at-home COVID-19 test "kit," which includes 2 at-home tests. MDHHS will provide the kits and educational materials, and schools will distribute the kits to students and staff who choose to enroll. There is no obligation to participate.

Who?

K–12 students, teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, teaching aides, and noninstructional staff are all eligible to opt into this program through their participating school or district. Participants will need to complete a brief intake survey to enroll.

Where?

Students and staff who enroll in the program will receive *at-home* COVID-19 tests kits distributed at school. Participants will then be able to test their students, themselves, or other family members right at home.

When?

Selected schools will be contacted about their interest in the pilot program starting the week of November 8th. Interested schools will be able to sign up to participate in 1 of 3 cohorts, depending on when they want to start. The first cohort of schools will start the MI Backpack Home Test program as early as November 15th. The program is intended to last 8 weeks, although participants can use the tests at any time up until the tests expire.

- Week 1: Districts and schools send out information about the program and collect opt-in info and pre-survey; MDHHS ships kits by end of Week 1 or beginning of Week 2.
- Week 2: Districts and schools receive kits and send 1 kit home with each participating student or staff member.
- Weeks 2-8: Parents and families use test kits at home when someone in the home has symptoms or an unmasked exposure to someone else with COVID-19.
- Week 5: MDHHS collects a post-survey asking about if/how tests were used.

• Week 8: MDHHS collects another round of post-survey information (to those who we haven't heard from yet + those who hadn't yet used the tests the first time)

How?

Michigan school districts and schools that are interested in offering this program to their students and staff must agree to the following requirements in order to enroll:

- Identify one point of contact per school and provide corresponding contact information
- Agree to give out information about MI Backpack Home Tests to students and staff and distribute kits to participants (1 kit/participant). Health Resource Advocates or School Liaisons assigned to the school can help distribute tests.
- Answer a survey in Week 5 asking about how the program is going in their district.

Why?

The state is committed to ensuring that Michigan students and educators are as safe as possible in the classroom to enable in-person learning. Layering prevention measures, like masking, testing, distancing, and ventilation, help create a safer environment for learning and keep kids, staff, and families safer.
